DATA ANALYSIS REPORT:  
THE RESULTS OF THE FISHTOWN INDUSTRIAL STUDY

The study of industrial history and activity in the Fishtown neighborhood of Philadelphia conducted by the staff of the Philadelphia Historical Commission identified 190 sites for investigation. Of those, the fifty-five resources were selected for documentation on the Bureau for Historic Preservation Pennsylvania Industrial Resource Survey forms or Pennsylvania Archeological Site Survey forms. Chosen as the best representatives of the industrial history of Fishtown, they also serve to illustrate its industrial character. The remaining sites were not documented on the Bureau's forms for a number of reasons:

1. The contract between the Bureau and the Historical Commission called for the completion of historic resource forms for approximately fifty sites,
2. Of the architectural sites;
  - a. Some sites identified as industrial later were judged to have no associated industrial activity,
  - b. The site experienced redevelopment or
  - c. The site is currently industrial, but had no historical industrial activity.
3. Of the archeological sites;
  - a. The site had disturbance from redevelopment or
  - b. No potential exists for additional information through excavation or
  - c. The site requires further research to determine its potential.

As each of these constitutes a potential resource for the Philadelphia Industrial Study, we intend to include each in the database of Philadelphia industrial resources, with the exception of those sites determined as having "no associated industrial history". The complete list of sites identified during the study accompanies this text and includes the survey assessment. Please refer to the "Fishtown Industrial Survey Comprehensive Site List" in Exhibit A.

To accurately analyze the industrial activity and industrial character of Fishtown requires more information than this survey revealed. Extensive research of over one hundred sites proved too ambitious for the length of this study period. With the opportunity to collect more data and

discover more sites, the industrial history of Fishtown could be analyzed by such categories as the number of and particular types of industry, length of business, mobility of companies, evolution of ownership, types of products, manufacturing or technological achievement, type and number of workers, movement of raw materials, relationship of various industries, relationship of process to building type and the like. As the city-wide study progresses, others categories may emerge. We intend to collect and record such information, and with the aid of a computer system, to interpret the data.

The investigation conducted during the study of primary and secondary historic documents pointed to certain trends regarding settlement patterns, physical evolution and industrial growth during Fishtown's three hundred year history. This effort led to the development of a historical context from which to evaluate the existing sites. Six chronological periods emerged and provided a framework to analyze individual resources. The survey team identified specific sites, researched the history of each and studied the physical remains. The combination of historical documentation and physical examination of the sites tested the contextual assumptions and further revealed the story of the industrial growth and development in Fishtown.

The fifty-five sites documented for the Bureau and studied during this project have been grouped into the six chronological periods for study. As industrial activity took place throughout a span of time at each site, two categories were considered; businesses that began during the period, and business that continued during the period. To illustrate the character of Fishtown's industrial activity, the sites were further divided into the particular type (Bureau for Historic Preservation classification). Actual numbers and percentages are attached to the categories; while they help in understanding industrial activity in each period, they do not provide a comprehensive statement.



### Early Colonization to circa to 1730

Because of the agrarian nature of the first chronological period, no industrial architectural sites were anticipated for this period. The potential existed for an early archeological site along the waterfront related to maritime activities; however, no sites were identified since heavy redevelopment along the Fishtown shoreline had obliterated most of the area of the earliest colonization. Table 1 reflects the lack of indentified sites for this period.

### From Shackamaxon to Kensington, circa 1730 to 1780

Visual identification of sites during this early period is difficult as evidence suggests that industrial buildings of this period were visually indistinguishable from other structures. Historical documents proved problematic for the identification of sites as well. Many of the craft and incipient industrial activities of the period, such as harness making, button making, iron forging and coopering could have occurred in rather small, undifferentiated buildings.

Marine-related industry began towards the end of this period, as shipwrights and the related trades moved up the Delaware River to Shackamaxon. A glass factory and a calico factory were built near Gunner's Run and tanning business was established at Cohocksink Creek. The riverbank and the area around the waterways have long since disappeared to redevelopment and transportation improvements, suggesting these sites could exist only as archeological sites. Sites which may reveal archeological remains are often preserved along waterfronts, since redevelopment often requires the creation of landfill. The survey identified two archaeological sites - the Eyre Shipyard and the Dyottville Glass Works. Only portions of both of these earlier industrial sites remain, for later industrial development disturbed early activity areas. The only resources identified for this period are archeological sites, the Eyre Shipyard and Dyottville Glass Works. Table 2 notes the two sites.

Waterfront Settlement and Early Industrialization,  
circa 1780 to 1830

Shipbuilding and related industry continued to dominate industrial activity in Fishtown during the years surrounding the turn of the nineteenth century, as nearly half of the residents listed in city directories of the period worked at waterfront related trades. Shipbuilders settled in Kensington and numerous support trades, such as carpentry and rope-making, joined shipwrights along the riverfront. The Dyottville Glass Works became a more stable business, with continuous production during this period.

No architectural resources related to this period were located. Again, redevelopment destroyed the buildings and structures related to waterfront activities. Industrial activity continued at the two sites identified from the previous period, as shown on Table 3.

Industrial Expansion and Diversification, circa 1830 to 1870

The physical character of Fishtown still reflected the pattern of growth found during 1830-1870, a time of increasing population and industrial development. Heavy industry located along Frankford Avenue and the Delaware, while lighter shops and commercial endeavors occurred along Girard Avenue. The sixteen sites identified from this period, listed on Table 4 reflect the variety of industries locating in Fishtown, and the appearance of the textile trades.

Industrial censuses state that textile manufacturers ranged in size from S. C. Ridpath & Co.'s 55 handlooms, with "5 of these looms at homes of weavers," making 25,000 yards of carpet, to James Finley's 8 looms producing 5,000 yards of carpet. The handloom tradition, producing "outwork" or work away from a factory or mill setting, appears particularly strong in carpet production. Physical evidence of the handloom weaver, emerging as an important contributor to the textile industry, created the largest category of sites for this interval. Preliminary research indicated the importance of the textile industry to Fishtown at the start of the survey; however, the number and significance of handloom carpet houses proved revealing.

The 1840 industrial census counted forty-seven establishments in Kensington including shipyards, textile, rolling and saw mills, glass houses, iron foundries and machine shops. These industries used steam engines and employed over 2500 people. By 1850 there were 114 manufacturing enterprises in the 4th and 5th wards of Kensington alone. While the identified sites reflect the

industrial expansion and development anticipated for this period, they do not represent the entire spectrum enumerated in the censuses. Factories, mills, processing plants, and bakeries contributed equal numbers of sites, while the presence of a brewery, foundry, meat packing plant and refinery demonstrate the appearance of industrial diversity in Fishtown.

#### The Industrial Era, circa 1870 to 1910

After the Civil War, the markets of the western frontier helped spur Fishtown's industrial and community growth, peaking in the period between 1880 and 1900. The survey's identification of 26 sites and the continuation of 18 other

sites illustrated Fishtown's industrial era, as illustrated by Table 5.

Two hundred and thirteen establishments were enumerated in the 1870 Industrial Census; more than one-fourth of the total industries listed included thirty-three boot and shoe makers, eleven bakers, and twenty cigar makers. While these statistics indicated the importance of local craft businesses during the beginning of this period, the identified sites did not always represent their significance. The classification of small and large businesses into the same particular type categories made the study of these sites difficult. For example, possible craft operations among surveyed sites consisted of the Edward Royal Stove and Range Manufacturer and the Knodel Sheet Iron and Tinsmith Shop, recorded under processing plant and factory. However, bakeries were counted separately and constitute almost eight percent of the total number located for the period.

Analysis demonstrated the handloom carpet houses remained the largest group of craft businesses in Fishtown during this period. These houses provided the largest percentage of sites still in operation from the previous period. In addition, the relatively high percentage of new sites joining this category illustrated the continuation of the "outwork" tradition into the twentieth century in Fishtown.

The increasing percentage of factories and processing plants exhibited the variety of industrial concerns operating during this period. Many different types of industrial activity are included in these categories, from sugar refining to metal processing. More specialized businesses, such as the Rohrer Furniture Factory and A. J. Reach & Company Sporting Goods, emerged as well. While the survey identified numerous industries, the diversity chronicled by the sites only moderately reflects that described in industrial censuses and other documents.

---

Twentieth Century Industry, circa 1910 to 1940

The industries that emerged or continued in Fishtown in the early years of the twentieth century included companies that reflected the increasing technology in mechanization, process or product. The organizational pattern of such firms

as American Can Company and Philadelphia Electric Company began to include professional personnel trained to research and develop new methods or machines. This trend signaled the highly mechanized production of tin cans and the development and manifestation of new technology in power production. Other firms engaging in industrial activity in Fishtown during this period reflected the increasing specialization of products. Electro-Nite Carbon Company, Filler Machine Company and Stevens Elevator Parts made a limited number of specific goods for a unlimited number of customers with specific needs.

The twentieth century also brought prosperity and the necessary expansion to a number of firms. Cramp & Sons acquired other shipyards and other related manufactories to satisfy the demand for its contracts. Other firms, like the Brownhill & Kramer Hosiery Mill, A. J. Reach & Company Sporting Goods and Pennsylvania Sugar Refining Company expanded into new facilities, indicating the successful continuation of their concerns.

Within Fishtown, the industry active during this period still pointed to diversity; in size of concern, in type of product and in domestic vs. mill or plant. Our statistics did not, however, account for these observations.

The analysis of sites during this period showed factory and processing activity, as well as the number and diversity of particular type for the years between 1910-1940. Of the fifty-five sites included in this study, ten located and began production in Fishtown during this period. Forty percent of them involved factory production. Ten percent each were involved in shops, processing, power and warehousing.

Of the thirty-two businesses that continued during this period twenty-eight percent represented factory production and eighteen percent were involved in processing. The twelve percent that operated bakeries, indicated the continued importance of local industry to the community. Table 6 list the numbers, names and statistics for the business operating in Fishtown following the turn of the twentieth century.

Forty-two of the fifty-five sites included in this study engaged in industrial activity in Fishtown during these years, although not all at the same time. This statistic reinforces the fact that much of the earlier industrial activity is hard to identify through physical or documentary evidence, and that redevelopment of the landscape and built environment has left only the most recent examples.

Fishtown and the Decline of Philadelphia Industry,  
circa 1940 to the Present

Industry suffered a decline throughout the city of Philadelphia, beginning with the Depression and continuing to the more recent past. Competition from other marketplaces and from other domestic regions lured some industry away from the City and signaled the end for others. The reduction of industrial activity in Fishtown mirrors that of the City at large. To illustrate this trend more closely, the remaining industry during this period has been considered in two groups; 1941-1960 and 1961-Present. Tables 7 and 8 reflect the industry in Fishtown during those periods.

Following the Second World War and continuing through 1960, twenty-two companies remained in business, a drop of slightly more than half the forty-two operating in the previous period. Of those, thirty-two percent operated factories and twenty percent were involved in processing plants. The balance were spread evenly throughout the other categories. During the more recent period, 1961 to the Present, only sixteen of the original fifty-five remain in operation. The type of manufactory remains similiar, as thirty-one percent operated factories and twenty-five manufactured in processing plants.

Of the sixteen companies listed in the last time period, ten survive.

**The Fishtown Historic District:  
A Potential National Register District**

The Fishtown neighborhood of Philadelphia has evolved from a village along the Delaware River into a cohesive, self-supporting working community with well defined boundaries. While conducting research and field reconnaissance of industrial sites for the Fishtown Architectural and Archeological Industrial Resource Survey, the survey team became very aware of the significance of this early Philadelphia neighborhood. As a historic district, Fishtown retains significant resources which reflect the character of a cohesive mixed residential, commercial, and industrial neighborhood providing dwellings, workplace, services, and facilities for worship, education, and social meetings. Although the community has changed since its late nineteenth population climax, with the loss of numerous eighteenth and early nineteenth century industrial sites, the built environment still reflects early nineteenth century settlement.

The industrial sites studied for this survey revealed that some of Fishtown's industry contributed significantly to American history. Examples of these industries include the A.J. Reach Sporting Goods Company, the Morse Elevator Company and the William Cramp & Sons Ship and Engine Building Company. Other more modest concerns, such as the Moses and Samuel Ridpath Handloom Carpet House and the Emil Knodel Sheet Metal and Tinsmith Shop, represent nineteenth century craft traditions which stretch into the twentieth century. This broad span of industrial sites all fit within the relatively small confines of the cohesive Fishtown neighborhood, illustrating the mixed character of the urban environment.

Defined as a triangular parcel of land bounded by Frankford Avenue on the west, East Norris Street on the north, and the Delaware River on the south and east, Fishtown appears eligible for the National Register of Historic Places as a historic district under Criteria A, as properties that are associated with events that have made a significant contribution to the broad pattern of our history.
